Then, at the end of October came the 9th Sunday before Christmas which then was the first Sunday in the Church's year. It was the time when the writer of the Christmas play 'sharpened her pencil'. I was always cast as the 'baddy' in that play!

I have so many memories of God touching my life all those years ago.

How do we fill the weeks approaching Christmas now?

How do we contact God?

Is it by remembering when God touched our lives in the past and how He did that?

Is it in the present when we pray to God?

Is it in some undefined future moment?

There is a lot to think about during the month of October.

This October we are encouraged to think how we can support those facing challenges in their lives. World Homeless Week is from Oct 7-13th, with World Homeless Day and World Mental Health Day on Thurs 10th Oct. Homelessness Sunday is then on Sun 13th Oct. In our worship, prayers, and Harvest giving (with many churches giving donations to South Gwynedd), we have the opportunity to reflect on what we as churches and individuals can do to make a difference to those in need of our love and support.

Street Pastor Update

This year has certainly proved to be busy - Jamaica, the Royal Garden Party and then in July, The Royal Welsh Show.

The presence of the Street Pastors at Builth Wells has been requested by the Corfield family whose son, James, died as a result of attempting to cross the River Wye back in 2017.

As per usual, we worked collaboratively with the St John's Ambulance, who manned the centre 24/7, the police, the Council, the Youth Groups as well as all those involved with the door staff. Over a period of 5 nights, we were able to deploy two groups of 6 Street Pastors who left the centre at 8pm and returned at approximately 4am. (We did have breaks!) and we were fortunate enough to have 2 Street Pastors at the Centre who supported friends of those who we brought in, usually because of a little too much drink. We did notice that there were a number of "spiking" and drug related incidents, which of course were reported to the police.



This is Detective Inspector Hamish, who "fell in love" with me. Surprising what a couple of lollipops can achieve!

However, our main concern was the number of Young Farmers (male) who were reporting suicidal tendencies to us. We were fortunate to be able to take them back to the centre to our other colleagues who were able to sit and talk matters through, inform the local mental health agencies, who made contact with these individuals the following day. (This was reported back to us from the agencies). The majority agreed to take up the offers that the mental health agencies proposed to them.

The underlying problem? One of loneliness and the administrative and financial burdens that the farming industry is being put under.

On a much more positive note, we met a group of farmers from Australia, New Zealand and the Falkland Islands. A group came across from the Isle of Man... and got lost! (“But there’s only one road where we come from!”) All came for the Sheep Shearing Event.

Incidents were few and far between, but working together, with everyone involved, ensured a safe outcome. Someone did go into the river and required help, but he was “Facetiming” his girlfriend at the time.... and fell in....and couldn’t get out! He was highly embarrassed to have all this recorded.

Returning to collaborative working with everyone, this is something to which the Church should ascribe and adopt. Whether high or middle of the road Christians or whatever denomination, we are here for the same purpose, to worship God and to spread the Word of the Gospel.

Monday, July 29th dawned like any other Monday for me, but as the day unfolded, the country was stunned by the trauma that occurred in Southport, the murders of Bebe, Elsie and Alice and the injuries that were inflicted on many other children and adults.

The following day, I received a request from Ascension Trust, the Pastor umbrella organisation, to ask for my availability to go to Southport as a Response Pastor. Initially, it appeared that the local Response and Street Pastor patrols were able to cover the first week but I travelled there the following Sunday and did an evening patrol with three others.

The one thing that has always struck me, when I attended the Manchester bombing and Grenfell Tower disasters was the silence. The silence is deafening. Yes, there is sound, but not from the people. They stand looking at the displays, reading the notes, weeping silently. Southport was no different.

Yet, here there appeared to be no grief - no doubt that will come in time, but emotions of numbness and disbelief, primarily that as a result of the event of July 29th, their town had become “an excuse” (as one lady put

it), for riots which ensued in towns and cities across the country, which was fuelled by misinformation. Southport is a rock solid community, supporting and comforting each other, regardless of race, colour, creed (or none), sexuality/gender issues.

On the following day, the four of us Response and Street Pastors had the privilege of attending two memorial services, one in the local Catholic Church, where we had the opportunity to meet and listen to some of those first on the scene.



Their accounts of what they witnessed are extremely harrowing and it will take a long time for them to process this, but their main question was “WHY?” and “I should have been able to do more.” In these instances, we cannot give an answer; we just listen to them, offer tissues, tea and jelly babies.



The evening service was a “Bubble Memorial” at The Atkinson Centre. The entire square was flooded with people, many of whom had come to lay flowers and to remember the event of July 29th, but the overwhelming majority of people were there to show their love, support and solidarity of a town in shock and in sorrow.

Tuesday dawned and so did our patrol and we had the opportunity to go to the sites to meet and listen to people, to show our care for the community. The police were so pleased to see us and thankful for the presence of the Pastors, who had been in attendance for the week and who were able to offer emotional support to those who were just bewildered.

What will I remember from this? I think I will remember the fragrance from the flowers that were laid at three sites over the town, the long conversation I had with an ex Muslim, now Christian gentleman, the kindness of the family, who took in all the soft toys, and there were hundreds, at one site every night and put them out in the morning, but most of all the love and support of each person towards their fellow man and their community.

Managing our Finances

Thank you to the Ministry Area Trustees and others who attended our special Ministry Area Council on September 24th. Archdeacon Robert Townsend and Mrs Liz Foskett, who is a diocesan book-keeper currently working with Ministry Areas on Ynys Môn, were also in attendance.

Meryl Gover, who has been collating and entering the financial information for all our churches into My Fund Accounting for 8 years now, gave an explanation of how our system currently works. Liz Foskett then explained how the system can work with the help of one of the diocesan book-keepers. We then had a discussion that highlighted the advantages and concerns about the proposed diocesan system, particularly about combining the Ministry Area finances into one bank account with separate funds for each church.

Hearing the needs and concerns that were voiced the Archdeacon put forward a proposal, whereby the Ministry Area accepts the provision of a book-keeper paid for by the diocese (which will probably be Liz Foskett), but the churches keep their separate bank accounts. We will then work with the book-keeper to see if we can reduce the number of bank accounts across the Ministry Area, predominantly by seeing what savings or investments might receive better returns by being held in the Diocesan Trust Fund. Individual churches would still have access to their own savings, but would receive a better rate of interest on them. We will then review how things are going in 3 years time.

All the Ministry Area Trustees present voted to accept this proposal, so we will now take this forward, whilst Meryl will rejoice in removing one of the many hats she wears. We would like to thank Archdeacon Robert and Liz Foskett for their time, graciousness, and expertise.

heavily involved with the Talyllyn Railway, whose Preservation Society AGM took place the same day. Some of these will have walked from Tywyn to Llanegryn tracing the first stage of the Trail for themselves.

Besides all this, we have seen a few funerals, and also a very welcome Baptism, that of Lily McEvoy, whose following filled the church very happily. We are also heartened by the comments in the Visitors' Book saying how much they appreciate finding an open church, and how they relish to peace to be found here. This reminds us all that the purpose of a church building is to enable people to meet with God above all else.

The Llan Project

The Llan Project is working to develop 6 churches across the diocese as Pilgrim Churches to have a particular role in highlighting the part pilgrimage can play in our life and faith journeys. St Cadfan's, the start of Llwybr Cadfan, the southern pilgrimage route to Ynys Enlli (Bardsey Island), is one of these.

As part of this, the Llan team are working with us to develop the churchyard as a community space with a path accessible to all users, and various stops for rest and reflection that tell the story of Cadfan's faith and journey from founding a church at Tywyn to founding a monastery at Ynys Enlli, as well as highlighting and developing the wildlife and biodiversity of our churchyard.

Currently Rev. Ruth is working with Katie Gill-Williams, the Major Pilgrim Churches Officer, Myfanwy Millward, the interpretative designer, and Rev. Jane Finn, Pilgrim priest at Aberdaron, to look at the wording of signage for the churchyard and church to ensure that faith and spirituality underpin the historical and heritage elements that are being highlighted.

This is an exciting project opening up the story of our faith and heritage in a new way, and hopefully encouraging more people to engage with all that St Cadfan's, Llwybr Cadfan, and the churches and landscape of our Ministry Area have to offer.
