Sixty-six years ago this month I started work at Pressed Steel Co in Cowley in Oxford. The company employed 10,000 people (mainly men) at that factory, 5000 in a new factory in Swindon, which had opened in 1956, and another 5000 in a factory in Glasgow. When I started work, a job at Pressed Steel was looked upon as a job for life.

Virtually all the management and supervisory staff had ‘started at the bottom and worked their way up’ and were all men. The factories made car bodies for nearly all the major car manufacturers including Rolls Royce, Rover, and Jaguar.

The parish of Cowley had grown very fast and the original church was totally overwhelmed by the incomers. The then Vicar went to see Lord Nuffield who owned Morris Motors (next door to Pressed Steel) and he paid for a brand new ‘mission church’ and hall to be built at the other end of the parish from the original ‘parish church’. Church attendance continued to increase so Lord Nuffield paid for a much larger new church to be built in the centre of the parish. That seated 500 and opened in 1938. It closed about 35 years ago and became the Oxfordshire County Council Records Office.

The original parish church (St. James’) and the ‘mission church’ (St. Francis) now have small congregations compared with when I was living and working in Cowley.

As far as the factories are concerned, Morris Motors closed some years ago as did the Glasgow factory and the Swindon factory is a ‘shadow of its former self’. The Pressed Steel factory where I started my motor industry career is now owned by BMW. It is where they make the Mini using automated machinery and employing less than half the number employed when I worked there.

I have written about this because I think there are many similarities with what has happened – and is still happening – in the Church today. I think the Church – of all denominations – must do as the motor industry was forced to do and that is CHANGE TO SURVIVE.

What happened to the motor industry in Oxford and Swindon also happened in Coventry and Birmingham. Most of the factories that I used to go to when I worked in the car industry have now gone. Those that are left employ much smaller workforces and use lots more automation. The

well-paid jobs of ‘semi-skilled production workers’ have virtually disappeared.

Of course, I fully realise that ‘making cars’ is totally different than ‘making Christians’ but the basics of both are still the same.

The Christian message is also still the same – Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever. Cars perform the same function ‘yesterday, today and forever’ but the way that they are made and work has changed out of all recognition. E.g. We now have electric cars and they are supposed to be the cars of the future.

We must surely find new ways of proclaiming the Christian faith afresh to new generations, new ways of welcoming and encouraging newcomers of all ages. I believe that most non-churchgoers perceive our churches to be ‘private worship clubs’ which are irrelevant to today’s world.

I also believe that many in our congregations (of all Christian denominations) also look on our churches as ‘private worship clubs’. This isn’t new. When I was Area Dean we had a Deanery meeting at which we discussed the implications of falling congregations and what should be done to overcome that. One person said ‘I’m not worried about that – my church will see me out!’

If the motor industry that I knew and worked in for 28 years hadn’t changed drastically there would probably have not been any car manufacturing plants in the U.K. now. Could that be the fate of our churches and chapels?

The answer is in OUR hands.

Jamaica

Jamaica? No, she went of her own accord!

On January 31st, BA flight 2263 departed from Gatwick Airport taking 5 of us on a trip to Jamaica to support and celebrate the Street Pastors initiative there. A trip of a lifetime. Chris Jewell, the coordinator of Street Pastors from Scotland, Bejoy Pal, the Ascension Trust CEO and umbrella organisation of Street Pastors, Dawn, Karen and myself all had the privilege of being selected to visit.

On arrival there in the heat of the evening, we were greeted by our hosts and given our itinerary for the next 10 days. It certainly was full-on, with Street Pastor patrols initially in the ghettos of Kingston, and School Pastor patrols and devotions in Trenchtown, a notorious area known for drive-by shootings, high unemployment, drug dealing, and trafficking.

One school we visited in Trenchtown is supported by the Street Pastors there and Ascension Trust. Operation Resolution has evolved as a result of school refusers, truanting, and those just “slipping through the net”. It endeavours to work with the destitute families and those just slightly on the wrong side of the law. The hope is to turn these youngsters around so that they will not become involved in crime. This school is for those aged 11+ and has been so successful that a primary and a nursery school has developed. This school, known as Joy Town, now takes children as young as 2. There are limited provisions and it was distressing to see youngsters not knowing how to play and interact with each other.

Smoking Ganja is an unspoken part of the culture and there are a number of cannabis dens and taverns, especially in the centre of Kingston itself. To be honest, I am surprised that all of us were not addicts by the time we left as the smell was very noticeable!

Going out on patrol and meeting the vendors who endeavour to sell their wares in the markets along the streets was an eye opener. One vendor spoke to us in Patwa (Jamaican speak), which was translated for us by one of our team, that if he can make enough in an evening to feed his habit then he's happy. It's probably a means of making his life a little more bearable. There is a great deal of poverty, but among these people there is a great deal of love.

Patwa is a great language and we learnt a few words - Yeahman and/or Noman seemed to be attached to the end of sentence. Wata - pretty obvious, Holla is stop! Listening to Jamaicans speaking to each other was a real eye opener and jaw dropper, but occasionally one was able to gather the drift of what was being said.

The Street Pastor patrols are so very different to what happens in this country. Whereas we go out with bulging backpacks containing everything from lollipops to flip flops, sick bags to foil blankets, their Ministry is somewhat different. Their patrols start early in the evening and last for no more than 2 hours, whereas we start our patrols about 10am and finish at 4am. Jamaican Street Pastors go out with nothing and they meet the people. Their emphasis is upon prayer and the people expect just that. (Just don't mention the machete!)

We had the opportunity to support the Jamaicans with commissioning of more Street Pastors and attend their 10th Street Pastor anniversary and service. About 500 attended the service which lasted for over 2 hours. If their Church services are less than 2 hours long, then the people feel hard done by! We attended a variety of services and all were well attended. 300 -400 people in a Church is not uncommon. Karan attended one where there were over 1700! The music was vibrant and the Gospel Choirs sang and sang and the sermons were over an hour long. The welcome we all received was second to none.

We also met the Jamaican High Commissioner and we were involved in a Zoom meeting with the Minister of Education, who both wanted to hear about how the high crime rate could be brought down and questioned what could be introduced into the schools to support this initiative. I said that I was troubled by the lack of stimulating toys for the pre 5 year olds and I pointed out that interactive, stimulating and engaging play with appropriate toys would have a marked effect upon the communities over a period of time. This was supported by my host, a paediatric professor/consultant. (More about him another time). This was taken on board and finance is to be made available together with appropriate training to introduce this initiative.

School Pastors in this country support students as they leave at the end of a school day. The police have noticed that any difficulties with youngsters occur directly after school until about 5:30pm. School Pastors in Jamaica actually go into the class and offer weekly devotions. This for me was very interesting and Carl, the Jamaican coordinator for School and Street Pastors has requested a more uniform approach to this and somehow I have become involved in this too. (Uncertain how!). The Minister of Education is keen to see this enterprise flourish, hoping that it may help to bring down the crime and violence in the country. The School Pastors also offer a listening ear to the students at break times and lunch times, just offering time and showing interest, which is sorely lacking in the lives of many. Speaking to secondary aged students in Trenchtown, it was obvious that many had witnessed drive-by shootings and street violence which had scarred and affected them, but they felt safe in group situations or street gangs, many of whom were at loggerheads with other gangs in their communities. So the cycle continues.

A trip to Bob Marley's museum was a highlight. Did you know that his song "One Love" was voted as the "anthem" for the millennium? Great song. Great words.

"One love, one heart

Let's get together and feel all right."

I'm pleading to mankind (One love)

Oh, Lord (One heart).

"Give thanks and praise to the Lord and we will feel all right."

Let's get together and feel all right"

One thing that really amused me was the huge speakers attached to the roofs of the cars, belting out reggae music. Jamaica is not a quiet place. And then there is the hooting of the car horns ... they hoot to let people in ... they hoot to thank you ... they hoot if you're driving too slow ... they hoot if you've done something wrong ... they hoot to their friends... they seem to hoot for no apparent reason.

If you think the roads are bad here, then they are pristine compared to theirs. It has become a national joke and the game of "Street Golf" is often mentioned (using the many pot holes!).

The trip to Montego Bay across the Blue Mountains was interesting. Montego Bay suffered the worst storms in living memory so there was no electricity along the coast and all the beaches were cordoned off for the clean up. The waves were pounding the sea walls and breaching them and arching over the cars travelling along the coastal roads. It was still very warm, however.

Again, we did both School and Street Pastor patrols, which was very similar to those in Kingston. As a matter of interest, when we stopped at Starbucks, the music playing was gospel music and when we asked the staff, they said that this is the norm.

It certainly was a wonderful experience and yes, I'll definitely go back there again.

PS. Still can't limbo dance!

The sea! We did manage a swim at a beach about 30 minutes drive from Kingstons. Beautifully warm ... and plenty of really loud reggae music from the enormous speakers strategically placed along the length of the beach to accompany our strokes.

The Archdeacon will be coming to licence the church wardens and affirm everyone in their different ministries. Churches may have a morning service if they wish, but prioritising the United Service would be good.

For discussion at Annual Congregational Meetings

This year all Ministry Areas in the Diocese are being encouraged to formulate Mission, Property, and Finance Development Plans (if they do not already have them – we don't!). The plans are envisaged to be active, working documents that change with time and circumstance to help us to think creatively about how we develop our mission and ministry in the years to come. At the last Ministry Area Council meeting on February 27th, diocesan initiatives to help us in managing our buildings and finances were presented for further discussion at our Congregational meetings and Ministry Area Council.

Property Management Meeting

To help us begin to formulate a Property Development Plan, Simon Ogdon, the Diocesan Director of Property, and Paul Skeet, the Diocesan Property Officer for the south of the diocese, will be joining us for a Property Management Meeting at 10.30 am on Tuesday 16th April at St Cadfan's Church to discuss the work required on all our church buildings. In the afternoon, they will be touring some of the churches to look at what repairs are needed. Everyone is welcome to the meeting.

Managing Ministry Area Finances

The diocese is also offering a scheme to support Ministry Areas in managing their finances, as many Ministry Areas struggle with finding enough volunteers to fill all the treasurer posts and other finance roles. In this scheme a part-time book-keeper, provided by the diocese at a rate based on a sliding scale depending on what the Ministry Area can afford, would gather all the finance information from the churches (a role carried out currently by local treasurers and Meryl Glover) and enter it all into My Fund Accounting. This is already used to generate reports for review by the Ministry Area Council, and for producing the Annual Accounts, which are then submitted to the Charity Commission. Each church will then have one or two people responsible for paying in collections and donations and paying out cheques. To enable this, the Ministry Area will need to combine the different church accounts into one Ministry Area account. However, the ability for people to support their own church will continue as each church will have separate general and restricted funds within the account, as well as their own paying in card, so the book-keeper knows which payments belong to which church. Individual church investments can be kept in the Bangor Diocesan Trust as CCLA investments with a simple system for accessing any funds required. In order to explain the scheme more fully and respond to any queries or questions, there is a meeting with Robert Townsend, and Owain Pritchard, the Director of Systems and Operations, at 7.00pm on Tuesday 30th April at St Cadfan's Church. Everyone is welcome to the meeting.

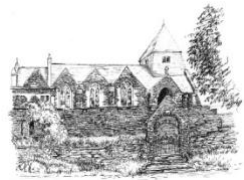


Arthog

Building matters still loom large at St. Cadfan's, as the Diocese are looking into ways to help us fund the repairs to the Vestry floor. We also have to replace a cast iron downspout on the tower, which will cost more than we expected. Again the diocesan Architectural Consultant is examining the details of this.

The Llan Project took a step forward this month with the visit of several members of the Project team to look at our churchyard, and to begin planning a path around it which would lead visitors on a sort of mini pilgrimage for reflection and as a starting point for the Pilgrim Path from St. Cadfan's to Bardsey. There could also be a space for small outdoor services. The Celtic emphasis on the material world as a sacramental sign of the Heavenly one also came into focus as this churchyard is recognized as an important ecological resource in Tywyn.

The Church Secretary found himself taking on an unaccustomed role one day recently, when Years One and Two from Ysgol Penbryn visited St. Cadfan's, and Ruth was unable to meet them. The substitute just happened to be in the church when they arrived, and was able to offer a brief guide to the church and what goes on in it.
