Well, it's way too much
You're never gonna get enough

Does anyone else feel the same as me?

It all started, for me, when I had a new carpet fitted in my lounge and it took me 50 minutes to clear the room. For me, that's 40 minutes too long, so when it was time to return all the bits and pieces to their rightful places,

I followed my own personal mantra. Do I want it and if so, why? Do I need it and if so, why? Who could benefit from it if I don't use it? (And it's just gathering dust and it's getting in the way and I'm not going to use it!)

The question I asked myself was why do I need this or that? Is it avarice /greed, (one of the seven deadly sins)? Avarice is a word seldom used to-day, but if you've ever watched classic characters like Ebenezer Scrooge or Cruella de Vil, you've seen avarice and greed at work. None of us is immune to greed or avarice, for everyday we are bombarded by messages of comfort or security or pleasure via the media, perhaps family or friends. I read somewhere that there are over 70 million people who have more wealth than me and with a population of over 7 billion people, this puts me in the wealthiest 1% of the planet by income. There are so many challenges in the world today, the state of the environment, the problems of hunger, access to clean water.. the list goes on. Yet the 1% have the capacity to make a difference.

"Consider the lilies of the field" story (Matthew 6 25-33) kept going through my mind as I created 3 piles - a "do I want it" pile, " a "do I need it" pile and "who would benefit from it" pile and I realised that as I worked through loads of things I didn't want or need, it's all about trust in God. Jesus says that we need not worry but put our trust in God to provide for our every need. We should not focus upon temporary, worldly and material wealth but strive for eternal treasures.

So, how does this relate to Advent, the time when we are watching patiently and quietly for the birth of our Saviour? Mary trusted the words of the Angel Gabriel who was sent by God to tell her that she would be the mother of our Lord. She responds "Here I am the handmaid of the Lord: let it be according to your word." She trusted the Word of God.

Then there's Joseph, who had planned to dismiss Mary quietly, but as the result of a dream from the angel of the Lord, he did as he was commanded and took Mary as his wife. He trusted in the words of the Lord.

Trust is therefore a core concept central to our faith, believing in God's promises and reliability and His will, even when times are difficult. It means placing confidence in God's plan and guidance, which can at times,

be very challenging for one and all

So, any books not looked at for over a year - gone to the charity shops, likewise any trinkets not required - all gone. Needlework magazines, having initially checked with a variety of museums and guilds (everything is now on "the cloud") - gone for recycling. Clothes not worn for over a year - gone to the charity shops too, so someone else can benefit from them.

How has this decluttering made me feel? Relieved! It has made me realise that, although physical stuff will deteriorate, treasures in heaven can't be destroyed, so my energies are better spent building treasures in Heaven. That's what matters. That's what lasts.


Bro Ystumanner - Taking Stock

I would like to thank the entire Team for making these Sessions a wonderful part of our worship and fellowship.


