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# Remembrance Rev Steve Rollins

As I write in the middle of October, after Homelessness Sunday and during Prisoners' Week, we are still in Ordinary Time and will be until Advent at the end of November, the month for which I'm writing these words. However, we're journeying through Michaelmastide, we're still in Harvesttide and are approaching Allhallowtide and the Kingdom season. Our main focus for the month will be Remembrance in all its aspects.

Appropriately, today we are asked to remember Esther John (born Qamar Zia, 14 October 1929, died 2 February 1960), a Pakistani nurse who was murdered in her bed at her home in Chichawatni for her efforts in

Christian evangelism. She was later recognised as a Christian martyr, and in 1998 she was honoured with a statue above the great west door of Westminster Abbey, founded by King Edward the Confessor (our saint for 13 October; d. 1066!). She took her place among nine other Christian martyrs of the twentieth century. And the subject of my seminar this evening on Global Christian Mission is Persecution, Suffering and the Growth of the Church.

These issues will be much on our minds and in our prayers at the beginning of November. Following All Saints' Day (1 Nov), we celebrate All Saints' Sunday as the International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP) when together we pray for Christians who are persecuted for their faith. 'Today, more than 360 M Christians worldwide suffer high levels of persecution and discrimination for their faith,' (Lausanne Movement, 2024). On Monday 3 November we remember All Souls as we build up for Remembrance Sunday (9 November) and the Armistice Day with their Acts of Remembrance ('at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month').

On perhaps a lighter note, as I write it's the feast day of Saint Tudur (not the famous organist in our town!). Tudur is thought to be the grandson of Seithenyn, a 6th-century prince of Cantref y Gwaelod, the legendary kingdom which is said to lie submerged beneath Cardigan Bay. According to legend, Seithenyn was tasked with keeping watch over the kingdom's sea defences and it was due to his neglect caused by drunkenness that led to it being overwhelmed by the sea.

To atone for his actions, Seithenyn's family turned to religion. Tudur is reputed to have founded a church at Darowen approximately 5 miles to the east of Machynlleth and was later buried there. A custom, now discontinued, developed on the Monday following Tudur's feast day called *Curo Tudor* (the beating of Tudur) during which a young man was chosen to represent Tudur and then carried through the village whilst being beaten on the back with sticks.

I witnessed a revival of this custom in St Tudur's church in Darowen during their Carolau Haf summer version of a Plygain with Spring and Summer carols. Fortunately, I was not personally persecuted and beaten, but it could have been any one of us...

I pray that you will have a blessed time of Remembrance.

# **Pastor Sunday**

Sunday, November 16th has been designated as Pastor Sunday, when we are asked to give thanks for all the Pastors who support their communities, caring, listening and helping anyone in need and without judgement.

This is even more poignant for the Bro Ystumanner Ministry Area, since we are currently developing School Pastors in Tywyn. We currently have 15 individuals going forward for training. This ecumenical initiative, established by the umbrella organisation, Ascension Trust, will support the school, the staff and the students at the end of the school day. The focus will be around the railway station.

So what do School Pastors actually do? Well. they will

- engage with the students in conversation,
- ensure that the students are safe.
- listen to any concerns and, if necessary, report back.
- diffuse any difficult situations should they arise.
- Support the vulnerable from any forms of abuse.
- support the staff, work with the police and the local Council.

There are many Pastor initiatives, such as Prayer Pastors, who are the backbone, for they pray whenever a patrol is out in the community. They will pray for any requests when contacted and respond to "arrow Prayers" and will endeavour to solve issues, such as making contact with any organ-

isations who can offer immediate support for individuals with mental health difficulties, accommodation for the night.

Rail Pastors (started in August 2014), also Street Pastors, work with the Samaritans and were requested by the British Transport Police to be a visible presence on the platforms and trains where there is a known high suicide rate. In 2022, it has been reported that the Rail Pastors prevented 52 people completing suicide. Working alongside them again, were the Prayer Pastors who provided the necessary support and contacted the appropriate organisations.

Street Pastors, although they are synonymous with the night time economy, are undertaking more and more daytime patrols. This is becoming more important, because, since Covid, there has been a "change" in society and with this change Street pastors have had to adapt. Mental health issues are a huge part of the work now and sourcing the necessary help is becoming central to the work of the Daytime Pastors.

Frequently, Street Pastors are invited to be a visible presence during national events, such as music festivals, food festivals, the Coronation of King Charles or the Royal Welsh Show - the latter does patrol during the night. The role of the Street Pastor is to care, to listen and to help: it is practical Christianity on the streets. It is where Jesus would be. After all, where did He do most of his ministry? He was out and about amongst the people.

Response Pastors (started in 2015 after the Shoreham air crash) are Street Pastors who have undertaken additional training to support the communities in times of national disaster. The last time Response Pastors were deployed was to Southport, to support the School Pastors there. Yes, whenever disasters involve predominantly children or schools, it is the School Pastors who are initially deployed. Unfortunately as knife crime appears to be on the increase, especially in the school situations, the work of the School pastors is becoming more and more important. In fact, Pastors are now recognised as the 4th emergency service.

There are so many interesting stories associated with Pastors, such as

arranging transport home for a rather inebriated chap who thought he was on a train to Manchester and he ended up in Newtown - quite a challenge for us all, including the Prayers Pastors, but we managed it! The joys of finding a golden handbag stuffed with money only to be told by the police that we couldn't keep it as it was part of a criminal investigation, to negotiating with an individual on the bridge over the River Severn in the pouring rain.

Nationwide there are over 240 initiatives but there are many towns and cities that have requested Pastor input, to keep their communities safe. Police have noted that areas are far more peaceful and the crime rate drops when Pastors are on patrol.

It is such a privilege to serve the communities and many areas have been served by Street Pastors since its outset in 2003.

#### **Interesting Facts**

- To date over 20,000 people are trained Pastors in UK alone
- Street Pastors are known globally
- Pastors are now recognised as the 4th emergency service.
- $\bullet$  Between December 1st and December 24th 2013, the Street Pastors nationally are believed to have saved the NHS £13 million pounds, by pro-

viding basic first aid and contacting family/friends to collect those suffering from an overindulgence of alcohol.

• At the Isle of Wight Music Festival 2025, the Street Pastor's averaged 24,000 steps per day!

#### Do you ever wonder how many visitors we get in St Cadfan's?

The National Churches Trust (who were so helpful in supporting the Vestry Floor project) have given us a counter which is discreetly mounted in the entrance to the church.

The counter we installed early in July this year. It shows that in just over three months the total number of people coming into the church was

over 1600! This includes the regular attenders at Sunday and Wednesday services, which we estimate at about 500. The remaining 1100+ includes all the coffee morning visitors, as well as exploring tourists, locals dropping in to light a candle or for a quiet sit and, of course, pilgrims embarking on the Llwybr Cadfan. Many of them find something special in our church.

So the number of visitors over the Summer period this year was approximately 1100! What an opportunity to tell people about what goes on in St Cadfan's and why we are here and what we believe.

Food for thought on ways we might do this better in years to come.
